PASTOR'S PAGE

From Pastor James Thomas

I am excited to introduce our all-church Lenten study, <u>Sacred Rhythms</u> by Ruth Haley Barton. Barton founded the Transforming Center (www.transformingcenter.org) to help Christians

grow closer to God and experience God's presence. She is a spiritual director, teacher, retreat leader, and author of numerous books. <u>Sacred Rhythms</u> is a DVD curriculum based on a book by the same title in which she "provides guidance for you and your group in a way that links the disciplines of the Christian faith to the most compelling desires of the human soul."

As you probably already know, the results of last spring's Natural Church Development survey indicated that our greatest need for growth as a church is in "Passionate Spirituality." NCD research indicates that "the important thing is not a church's style, but the degree to which


faith is actually lived out with commitment, passion, and enthusiasm. This is what sets growing churches apart from non-growing ones... The secret of passionate spirituality is (a) to develop a threefold orientation of being based on the Word, directed by the Spirit, and focused on the world, and (b) to bring these three dimensions into balance." Please note that this is not about style. It need not change how we do things, but it should change why we do things. Passionate Spirituality is about our hearts. The old acting question, "What's my motivation?" is the question we are being encouraged to

consider. We desire to develop a deep, passionate motivation to love and to serve God. We believe that this is what will lead us to the next stage of church health.

The needed change cannot occur just through learning or through effort. It calls for transformation of our hearts. Talking (or preaching) alone about growing a relationship is not very effective in building our walk with God. The key to spiritual transformation is through practice of the spiritual disciplines.

Disciplines are exercises that must be experienced in order for them to have their desired effect. To that end, we have invited a spiritual director to our session retreat at Camp Krislund on

February 2 and 3 to guide your leadership in not only learning about God's presence in our lives, but seeking to experience God's presence and direction for us. We have the same goal in presenting <u>Sacred Rhythms</u> as our Lenten study for the congregation. This curriculum is not just about learning, but also about experiencing the disciplines described. In each lesson, Barton directs participants to practice what she has taught.

The back cover of the <u>Sacred Rhythms</u> Participants Guide describes the study:

"Drawing on the imagery of the natural rhythms of the created order, <u>Sacred</u> <u>Rhythms</u> explores the practices that spiritual seekers and growing disciples have used throughout history to grow closer to God. In a similar way, the disciplines of the spiritual life are the basic components of the rhythm of intimacy that feeds the soul, keeping Christians open and available to God's surprising initiative in their lives."

suspect that this may create some Ι discomfort for some. Modern Presbyterians are not well known for our openness to "God's surprising initiative!" We like things to be orderly and controlled. However, Christians throughout the centuries have nurtured their relationship with God using the disciplines we will be practicing studying and through Sacred Rhythms. History is rich with accounts of even the most Reformed of believers who have experienced God not just in their minds but also deeply in their hearts through spiritual practices. These practices have great value to our souls and to our capacity to faithfully experience and follow God. We deprive ourselves of something wonderful when we ignore them.

Please be assured no-one will be forced to do anything they do not wish to do. Each participant will be encouraged to engage at their own comfort level. By design, the disciplines are varied because people are varied. Some practices might prove to be exceptionally meaningful for you and not very meaningful for someone else. Something else may seem silly to you, but will be deeply meaningful for someone else. Willingness to join the journey is the key to success, even though the exact journey will be different for different people.

Our Creator made us for relationship. Our Lenten focus last year was on our relationships with each other. This year our focus is on relating to God. Jesus himself defined eternal life in a prayer to the Father: "Now this is eternal life: that they know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you have sent." (John 17:3) In Greek there are two words for "know." The first is oida which means knowing about something. The second is ginosko, which is the word used here. It expresses a different kind of knowledge which "implies an active relation between the one who knows and the person or thing known... oida expresses the fact that the object has simply come within the scope of the 'knower's' perception." Ginosko is a relational word. In using this word, Jesus stated that we are to live in relationship with God.

Our Lenten focus is designed to help us build our relationships with God. Sermons and worship services through Lent will focus on the themes of Sacred Rhythms. But participants will not receive the full benefit of this study without practicing the disciplines. We are offering a number of small groups in which participants will experience this curriculum together. Again, the design of this recognizes that each person is on their own journey, and there will be no judgment about where a person is on their journey nor about how well a person practices any of the disciplines. We will be discovering our own paths, but doing so together. The important thing in our relationship with God is not where we are, but the direction in which we are going. We want to create opportunity for each person to grow closer to God and we believe that Sacred Rhythms is a great way to do that.

Small groups will begin during the week of February 18, and run through Holy Week. The following small groups are being offered:

THE WORK CONTINUES

At the time of this writing (mid January) snow covers the fields and forests of our valley. This is the first snow of the winter and it certainly changes the appearance of our landscape. Actually, in spite of the cold weather, the snow cover is welcomed. Now when we look out, we cannot see the stones that need to be moved or the leaves as yet un-raked or fallen sticks that need to be taken to the brush pile. In other words, the snow provides a good excuse to avoid the many outdoor chores that still await. So I can read, play computer games or watch TV without feeling guilty.

But second thoughts remind me that the tasks will still be there when the snow melts and spring comes. So instead of being lazy through these long winter weeks, I should be preparing for a new season. I could be building bird houses, sharpening tools and blades, tuning up engines, and pruning trees and bushes.

Does winter also give opportunity to excuse ourselves from church programs and activities? It seems easier to give into the temptation to be absent from meetings, classes and worship. Yet the work continues; and the church's mission remains. Let us continue to show forth God's love as we work and worship together. Another advantage of the snow is that has enabled me to try out the cross-country skis for the first time since we have moved back to Treaster Valley. I slung the skis on my shoulder and trudged out to the nearby open field. I made my way laboriously to the top of the hill and removed the skis from my shoulder and placed them on the ground, pointing them generally in the direction I wanted to go. A little push and they began to slide side by side. The crunching sound they made soon became a whistle, and then a light whisper. Little curls of snow swirled behind them as they continued down the hill, through the gap in the fence row, and slowed to a gentle stop on the level by the road.


It was a beautiful "run." So I walked down the hill and picked up the skis and determined that the next time I would have the courage to RIDE them down.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMUNIQUE

In our house, once the Christmas tree is undecorated and dragged outside, the transition to the next holiday is a smooth one. Snowmen remain on their shelves, pine greenery stays put, and surviving red poinsettias prepare the way for Valentine decorations. Add an assortment of red hearts, and voila! We're ready for Cupid! What we weren't ready for was the realization that the beginning of Lent and Valentine's Day occupy the same calendar date this year! Fortunately, there is still some time to get ready.

One of the common ways to prepare to enter Lent is to spend some time pondering what we will "give up" for the forty days leading up to Easter. Perhaps we can remake this idea this year, so that instead of looking for things to "give up" we can look for ways to "open up" space in our lives to draw closer to God.

As a church this month, we will begin a Lenten study called, Sacred Rhythms, designed to do that very thing: help us create space in our lives to enter into a deeper intimacy with God. What better time to begin to do this than during the days of Lent? Unlike the usually busy weeks of Advent, Lent offers a longer and more contemplative time to develop habits and practices that draw us closer to God. In her book, Ruth Haley Barton invites readers to experience a rhythm of spiritual practices that keep us open and available to the presence of God. I'm excited about this study, and look forward to growing together as a congregation Sunday morning under Pastor Jim's preaching and in small groups throughout the week.

The Youth and children will study the same subject, with a few variations. During our regular Youth group meetings on Sunday evenings, young people in grades 6-12 will use Stephen Smith's book, <u>Soul Shaping</u>, to give us practical wisdom and meaningful experiences for our spiritual journey. Clay and other media will creatively engage our hands and hearts.

Children in Jr. Church (K-5) will experience similar, age-appropriate lessons on prayer, listening to God's voice in the Scripture and Sabbath rest. Then each Sunday afternoon during Lent, from 4-6 PM, this same age group will meet on the third floor for Kidz Klub, a high energy, hands on, Bible-based time of FUN and LEARNING! This year we will journey to Jerusalem for the annual Feast of Passover! Along the way we'll make our own unleavened bread, prepare a Passover meal, and re-visit God's miracles in Egypt. By our last Kidz Klub, kids will have a greater understanding of God's work of redemption; how Jesus was the Lamb of God who came to take away the sin of the world, and how our own celebration of Communion fits into that story. Supper is provided every night at 5:30 PM. Kidz Klub begins on Sunday, February 25. Be sure to look ahead and mark your calendar for the Easter family event, "Walk with Jesus" on March 31, and catch the details on another page of this Panorama (see the bottom of page 3).

An all-church pot-luck dinner at the Lumina Center will take place the first Sunday of Lent, February 18. The Christian Education Committee has chosen this time to invite a representative from Camp Krislund to come and explain the many opportunities Krislund offers our church, our families, and our children. We will spend the time from 4-6 PM enjoying food, each other's conversations, some family-friendly games, a sneak peek at Kidz Klub, and a presentation from Camp Krislund.

As you can see, there will be many opportunities to enter into and experience the weeks we call Lent. My hope and prayer for myself and all of us is that our observance of Lent will become more than just a seasonal exercise, and develop instead, into a lifestyle of purposefully ordering our lives for spiritual growth. Growth in our depth of love for Jesus and our depth of love for each other.

lack History Month officially began being recognized starting as part of the 1976 United States Bicentennial. President Gerald Ford spoke urging Americans to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." To help showcase some of these great accomplishments the choir anthems during the month of February come from the African American Traditions, namely spirituals. The term spiritual is derived from the term spiritual song, found in Ephesians 5:19, "Speaking to yourselves in psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord." Spirituals were originally taught in the oral

tradition as there wasn't sheet music written to pass the music from generation to generation. Describing the hardships of slavery, many songs are expressions of Christian faith, while others are thought to contain instructions to fugitive slaves on how to avoid capture while on route to freedom.

We returned to school after the holidays, happy to see our friends, eager to play, and excited to learn! Everyone had a chance to bring a favorite Christmas toy for show and tell. Even the most reserved child did a great job telling us who gave them the gift and showing us how they play with it. We (especially Mrs. Powell and Mrs. Westover) learned a whole lot about Hatchimals. Santa packed quite a number onto his sleigh it seems! The Spidey ball helicopter made a big impact (and not just on the ceiling), as did the ever-popular Barbie (Barbie the Equestrian, Barbie the Vet, and Barbie the Dreamcamper Driver). We all wished we had time to each take a ride on the red hopping donkey and try out the remote control tractor and Ninja skateboarder... And we all enjoyed petting the tiger (she purrs!) and listening to a harmonica solo. Entrance into
