#### **HOLY WEEK**


MAUNDY THURSDAY: We will remember the events of the last hours of Jesus beginning with a Soup Supper in the Baraca Room at 6:30 PM on Thursday, March 29. We will also observe the sacrament of the Lord's Supper around tables as we believe it was first experienced by Jesus and his disciples. We will then proceed to the sanctuary for a service of Tenebrae, during which we will hear the gospel accounts of Jesus' arrest and crucifixion as the lights are dimmed to the point of darkness. This is a deeply moving service and is a very helpful way to remember what Jesus did for us.

**GOOD FRIDAY SERVICES:** Pastors from a number of area churches will lead a Stations of the Cross service at Sacred Heart Catholic Church at 11 AM on Good Friday, March 30. Then, at 11:45 AM, all who wish to follow the cross through Lewistown will meet outside Sacred Heart to walk through our community, during which we will stop and pray for various ministries and community groups.

**FAMILY EASTER EVENT: Saturday, March 31, 8:45 AM—11:45 AM** (the day before Easter Sunday) Join us as kids and their families and friends travel through five stations uniquely designed to encourage thinking and get families talking about the final events of Jesus life here on earth. We will experience the excitement surrounding Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem, the significance of the Last Supper, the darkness at Gethsemane, the sacrifice Jesus made on the cross, and the joy of His resurrection. Hands on learning with take home activities to continue your

journey with Jesus at home. Walk with Jesus begins at 8:45 AM and will conclude at 11:45 AM. Walk with Jesus will incorporate our traditional Easter Egg hunt so there will be no separate egg hunt this year.

#### **EASTER MORNING WORSHIP:**

**Early Service:** We will meet at Mount Rock Cemetery at 7:30 AM for a short service to consider the wonder of the women who discovered the empty tomb and the joy of discovering that Jesus had risen from the dead.

**Resurrection Celebration:** Our worship service at our regular time (10:30 AM) on Easter Sunday will celebrate the risen Lord with joyful hymns and anthem, and a reflection on what the resurrection means for us!

#### PASTOR'S PAGE

A man named Jonathan Rauch is credited with coining a new term in the May 2003 issue of the Atlantic Monthly. Rauch reported that when he was asked about his religious convictions, his initial impulse was to declare that he was an Atheist. But upon reflection, he decided to label himself an Apatheist, defining Apatheism as "a disinclination to care all that much about one's own religion, and an even stronger disinclination to care about other people's."



If you are observant, you have probably recognized Apatheism in yourself or in those around you, even if you didn't yet have Raush's clever terminology for it. Most Apatheists do not know that they are Apatheists — and most of them do not care. That is the point of Apatheism! But there is a growing number of Apatheists who live the contradiction of believing that Apatheism is the right way to "believe." They might insist that Apatheism is also a right way not to believe. But whether they care or not, their choices and attitudes are based in belief. Apatheists believe that God, religion, faith, etc. are not important enough to get worked up over. Some are even zealous in their apathy! The picture above is a good illustration of this attitude. If the man truly did not care, he would not have gone to the effort of writing on his hand and then holding his hand where the viewer could see it. In his original article in the Atlantic Monthly, Raush himself contradicts his claim to true apathy when he responds to Richard Rorty's wish for "a world of pragmatic atheists" with "best of all would be a world generously leavened with apatheists: people who feel at ease with religion even if they are irreligious; people who may themselves be members of religious communities, but who are neither controlled by godly passions nor concerned about the religious beliefs of others." While he says he doesn't care, he cares enough to believe that everyone would be better off if they joined him in not caring.

Interestingly, one can be a believing Apatheist (an apathetic Theist) or an unbelieving (or questioning) Apatheist (an apathetic Agnostic). Faith or lack of faith is not the issue. The issue is the level of faith. It is generally agreed that it is

Apatheist. Atheists tend to care very passionately about their belief that God does not exist. They often work hard to "help" others to come to agreement with their position. Raush is pleased to report that the "regular church-goers can, and often do, rank quite high the Apatheism scale... on people choose Some deliberately and some people

of reasons to attend religious services: to connect with a culture or a community, so socialize, to expose children to religion, to find the warming comfort of familiar ritual. The softer denominations in America are packed with Apatheists."

However, I maintain that it is also not possible to be a Christian Apatheist — although many people fall into a category that seems to fit that description. Jesus himself speaks clearly against Apatheism.

"Jesus said to his disciples, 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it. What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? For the Son of Man is going to come in his Father's glory with his angels, and then he will reward each person according to what they have done (Matthew 16:24-27)."

By definition, Christians care about God! By definition, Christians care about people. If we care about God and we care about people, we will want to introduce people to Christ. If we care about our own souls, we will not want to lose them. If we do not care, we must seriously ask what is wrong with us! Eternity is in the balance! Can we really not care if we have any inkling of trust in the Word of God which tells us that God will call us and our neighbors to account? Can we truly claim to believe in Jesus Christ and ignore His clear warnings? Whether we believe, choose not to believe, or fail to have the energy to choose anything, Scripture says that we will still answer to God. This is something to care about!!

# LET'S GO FLY A KITE

At this writing, a thick blanket of snow and ice covers our whole valley. Hopefully the frozen February will soon give way to muddy March. Folklore has it that the month of March is usually a very windy month. So, it may provide many opportunities for kite flying.

Many years ago Carol gave me two books which gave me great encouragement in my preparation for the ministry. The books were entitled: The High Calling and The Gauntlet. The featured clergy person was Rev. London Wingo. In one of the parishes, pastor Wingo encourage the youth of the church to have a kite flying contest. Local businesses paid to have their advertisements printed on the kites. All the kites were sent aloft. Prizes were awarded in several categories, and all of the donated money was used to further the youth missions.

Once my brother and I built our own kite. It was over five feet tall, and we covered it with the strongest paper we could find. We got our string by ripping out the seams of old feed sacks and rolling it into a hug ball. On a late March afternoon we took the kite and string out into the

meadow and proudly watch as the colorful kite climbed high into the sky. Evening chores soon took us from our game, we tied the string to a fence post and left the kite sailing silently over the farm. After milking, we found the kite still flying. Even after dark, when the flashlight could no longer spot it, we knew the kite was still flying because we could feel it tugging on the string. Sometime during the night the wind fell, and so did the kite.

I believe that there are some valuable lessons we can learn by flying a kite. First, we can learn that there is a power which is unseen, but powerful enough to lift our dreams and aspirations to high realms. A second lesson is that we must hold the string to capture the power of the wind. And, third that even though we cannot see it, there is an uplifting Spirit which call us to a closer relationship with God and with each other. So to have a richer, fuller faith, let's go fly a kite.

"O Lord my God, thou art very great—who rides on the wings of the wind. Who makes the winds your messengers."

# PRESCHOOL NEWS

"I'm a little snowman, look at me, Here are my buttons; one, two, three! These are my eyes and my carrot nose, Give me a hat, please; Brrr! It's cold!"

Our three year old class enjoyed singing this song; especially when they were watching the snowflakes fall outside our window and when "Brr! It's cold!" applied. Our weather arrow has been spinning around the weather chart this month, landing on "snowy" one morning, "sunny" by afternoon, and "rainy" the next day. School delays and cancellations have caused schedules to be in a bit of a flurry, but we have tried to maintain a predictable daily pattern despite the erratic winter weather.

Both nursery school and preschool classes have been working hard on letters and their sounds during first circle time. Big, brown, bashful, Barney the bear, backed into the classroom and bounced onto the big, blue bean bag with a backpack full of "B" objects for the students to guess. (bet you weren't baffled a bit!) Preschoolers have been practicing beginning and ending sounds and matching letters to the correct sound.

Our four and five year olds had some extra practice writing their names and the names of their classmates during the days that our "post office" was set up at play time. It is a very exciting moment for student and teacher alike when a child asks, "How do you write \_\_\_\_\_?" The teacher responds, "What letter says \_\_\_\_?" and the student prints it correctly! There were some very proud students who toted Valentines into the classroom on party day and announced, "I wrote these names myself!" (kudos to the patient parents!)

Mathematical learning happens every day in both nursery school and preschool classrooms from sorting, classifying and counting tabletop activities to circle time problem solving and rhythm clapping games. The classroom "store" provided an enjoyable introduction to money and economics. (and "recycling" on the day the store closed) This month, hearts of all sizes have been the objects we've counted, sequenced, and thought critically about. (who has the valentine now?)

By far the most fun and popular math activity in recent weeks has been our "snowball fights". Way back in December, when the children were especially aware of their (and their friend's) behavior, some were sure that certain people

would end up on the Naughty List for instigating such frivolity. Once they realized that "snowballs" in the classroom was a sanctioned way to learn, their consciences were at rest and they could join in the fun. Numerals flashed and the corresponding number of snowballs was counted and thrown; or carried under the chin and dropped in a tub; or tossed into a bucket. What fun! And nobody's hands got cold or wet!

Sometimes the cold, wet days of not being able to get outside and run off energy exhibits itself in "not o.k." behavior. Those are the days we try to remind each other about the story of the wise man and the foolish man that we learned in Chapel time with Pastor Jim. When we choose to obey God ("Be kind to one another.", for example) we are wise and life goes better. When we choose not to live God's way, we are foolish and the results are not pleasant. That's true, no matter what the weather!

I suppose we could blame that ole groundhog, Phil, for keeping us cooped up inside, but spring will get here in due time, whether or not we like the weather of the moment. Personally, I'm still hoping for one, good, snowman-making snow! (I just try not to say it in front of Mrs. Powell;))






# CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMUNIQUE

The Jesus Storybook Bible has been one of my favorite children's resources for a long time now, but it was only recently that I read the 19<sup>th</sup> century poem written at the top of the "Acknowledgements" page. Its author is Josiah Conder. This is the poem:



"Tis not that I did choose Thee, For Lord, that could not be; This heart would still refuse Thee, Hadst Thou not chosen me... My heart owns none before Thee, For Thy rich grace I thirst: This knowing, if I love Thee, Thou must have loved me first."

Ruth Haley Barton echoes these thoughts in the first chapter of Sacred Rhythms, our allchurch Lenten study, when she writes about our longing to know more of God. "The stirring of spiritual desire indicates that God's Spirit is already at work within us, drawing us to Himself. We love God because He first loved us. We long for God because He first longed for us. We reach for God because He first reached for us. Nothing in the spiritual life originates with us. It all God" originates with (p25).What encouragement to seek God, knowing that He has initiated our seeking and is continuing to pursue relationship with us!

That God initiates and pursues relationship with people of *all* ages has become a wonderful encouragement and motivation to me. I've anticipated and prayed for God's Spirit to work in us during this study of spiritual disciplines, but recently I was reminded to be careful not to underestimate the power of God's Spirit at work in the life of a child. Philippians 2:13 is as true for a believer who is four as it is for a believer who is forty four ("God is working in you, giving you the desire and the power to do what pleases him." NLT). God does not wait until a certain age to begin to use those whose hearts are given to Him.

Our children are precious gifts to their families and to our church family! And while they

do not yet possess the maturity or life experience to hold adult-size leadership positions, our children can lead us into a deeper, purer faith. They can also be used by God to accomplish great things for the Kingdom! One doesn't have to turn too many pages of scripture to read stories of children whose closeness to their Father in heaven is to be aspired to, if not slightly envied (Think young Samuel, shepherd boy David, and Naaman's servant girl, to name iust a few Old Testament examples). There is a wonderful openness present in the heart of a child; a predictable spontaneity; a vulnerability and honesty that knows no pretense, and a deep desire to be loved. When asked by his accoladeseeking, power hungry disciples, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" Jesus went so far as to say, "Unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven" (Mt. 18:1-4). Humble dependency is the natural state of affairs for a child. A child's trust in others is simple and abandoned. Pure faith is not a learned part of a child's character. He or she simply cannot survive without trusting those around them. A child is completely dependent on others to provide for what he/she needs to live. While a child has no choice but to be dependent, Jesus says we, as adults and younger adults, must change from our determination to take care of ourselves, to make things happen and maintain control, to a lifestyle of humble trust and dependence on God to provide everything that we need (both material and immaterial).

As we continue in our study of Sacred Rhythms, we would do well to pay attention to our children and observe and ask how God is working in them. They may very well be experiencing God's Spirit in ways that we might miss. We dare not deter their openness and enthusiasm toward God's ways or cause them to stumble in their spiritual journey. Matthew 18:6 paints a disastrous end to such a course. the results of welcoming However, encouraging a child's spiritual growth is as monumentally beautiful as causing him or her to stumble is deadly: "Whoever welcomes a little child like this in my name welcomes me." Let us together welcome the work of change and growth that God desires to do in our lives and in the lives of our children this Lenten season.



#### ADDITIONS TO THE ANNUAL REPORT

#### THE DAYTECS



We've seen beautiful such growth here in our team (our medical staff as well as home church community) over the past year. Our focus has been on nurturina and cultivating deep

truth in our team, working through inner healing, bondage breaking, discipling with them, and in turn watching them take it and apply it to the lives around them. They are exploding with growth! Our home has become a healing place for people who are miscarrying, hurting, desiring to walk in freedom from sexual addictions, and also a postpartum home for women who do not have a support system, or are recovering from surgery. A Mangyan Tribal family of eight stayed with us in December for three weeks after the mother, Dalia, had surgery to deliver her baby and remove a ten pound tumor. They are from a village three hours away. Every doctor said she and baby would die. We believed they would live. They are both miracles. We did checkups every week for six months and arranged for surgeons and specialists to see her. They were here over Christmas and it was so humbling, so beautiful to be able to share life together and be reminded of what is most important in life; Loving God and loving people. They came to visit us yesterday and Dalia clung to me sobbing, her tears soaking my shirt. "Mahal na mahal Kita, kapatid." she whispered over and over. "I love you so very much, my sister." I cried with her. We are sisters.

Francis continues to do outreach in many villages every week, some local, some many islands away. We continue to partner and bridge the relationships of the local pastors. There was so much division, quarreling, and brokenness

between the pastors/churches. We now are seeing healing and love, restoration. A few weeks ago, they asked if we could host the local pastors and families for an evening of fellowship. There were over 70 people at our home for dinner! They worshipped together and began to repent to each other for bitterness and unforgiveness. Tears fell. It was so beautiful! They are planning to come to our home again in the next several months for an overnight fellowship. We are delivering lots of babies in the clinic and many of them are from Maranao Muslim families who have fled the ISIS invasion of Marawi down south. We love that God has brought them to us so that we can show them His love. We have been taking baskets of groceries and visiting them in their homes, sharing the love of Jesus. Last month we also were honored to give hospice care to our neighbor who was dying of cancer. His family was so raw and broken, unsure of how to care for him, and his oncologist did not offer any care. We brought oxygen, changed his catheter, provided pain med injections every few hours and sat with them, praying and crying with them until He passed away. His daughter is now coming to our home several times a week and for home church on Sundays, hearing the gospel and asking lots of questions. What a joy.

We have Australian friends, a couple, who are planning to move here in this next year to partner with us long-term. They have vision to start a Refuge for women in sex trafficking, and love our vision and ministry in Puerto. They have come many times in the past three years to work with us.

We are excited to see what God continues to do in the next year with new partnerships. We are so thankful for our church family there at Lewistown Presbyterian Church, and we pray for you all often. Thank you for giving, for praying, for continuing to hold on to us. We could not be the Hands and Feet of Jesus without all of you holding us up. Blessings on you this year! Grace and Peace.
