### PASTOR'S PAGE

Joseph of Cyprus had a very important role in the early church. Although you probably know him better as Barnabas, the nickname given to him by the apostles. Barnabas means "son of encouragement."

Barnabas first appears in Acts 4:36 when he brings a gift to the early church.

He appears again in Acts 9 when the disciples are struggling about whether or not to trust the veracity of the Apostle Paul's conversion. Barnabas encourages them to believe him based on the evidence of God's work in him. In Acts 11, Barnabas arrives in Antioch and when he, "saw what the grace of God had done, he was glad and encouraged them all to remain true to the Lord with all their hearts." Acts chapters 11 through 14 recount the shared ministry of Paul and Barnabas. But in Acts 15, Paul and Barnabas find themselves at odds over John Mark, a potential partner in ministry who had previously disappointed Paul. Barnabas wants to give him another chance, while Paul does not. This leads Paul and Barnabas to part ways. Barnabas takes John Mark with him on a missionary journey to Cyprus and Paul takes Silas to Syria. As the account progresses, there is no indication that Barnabas had chosen poorly. In fact, we read in 2 Timothy 4:11 Paul asking Timothy to bring John Mark for a visit, because, "he is helpful to me in my ministry." Had Barnabas not encouraged John Mark to continue in ministry, Paul and the church would have been poorer for it.

Encouragement is very important! Have you ever received one of those notes or comments that buoyed your spirit? Some people, like Barnabas, seem to be gifted with the ability to encourage others. It is a wonderful and necessary we Yet should leave the task gift! of encouragement only to those rare few to whom it comes naturally? I do not think so! We all know the value of being encouraged, and no one is unable to give encouragement. So I believe we are all called to encourage each other! In 1 Thessalonians 5:11, Paul tells the believers to, "encourage one another and build each other up."

Here are a number of ways you can bring encouragement to others:



Speak words of encouragement:

"Pleasant words bring healing to the bones." (Proverbs 16:24). We often worry how our words will be received and there are manv people who do not appear to receive positive comments very well. However, as awkward as they seem to be receiving

your words, it is highly likely that under the surface, your words are blessing them deeply.

**Write a note:** The hand-written note is almost a lost art. But is shouldn't be. While positive comments on social media are helpful, written notes of encouragement are powerful! I confess that I have a box in which I keep every encouraging note I've ever received. Sometimes, when I'm feeling down and wondering if my life and work matters, I read through those notes and am reminded that I have indeed had a positive impact in peoples' lives.

**Be present:** "Parakaleo" is a Greek word for encouragement. It is made up of the root word "kaleo" which means "called" and the prefix "para" which means "alongside." The power of presence is undeniable.

One key to effective encouragement is to **be specific**. While general words of encouragement are helpful, specific words are far more so. If someone has helped you or inspired you in a specific way, let them know! The specificity will give your words much more power.

Let us covenant to establish a spirit of encouragement in our church! Garrett Kell writes, "When encouragement is absent from the life of a church people will feel unloved, unimportant, useless and forgotten. God knows his people are in need of grace-filled reminders, so he calls us to 'encourage one another daily' (Hebrews 3:13)." I think we know how valuable our sisters and brothers in Christ are to us, but the question we should ask ourselves is—do they know it?! Let us not assume that others know how much we value them. Let's tell them!

Encouragement brings life. It is like oxygen for the soul. Who can you encourage today?

"How are we going to get him out?!" Good questions, we're just not sure what the answers are to some of them! But even Dr. Seuss didn't have all the answers..."why are they glad, and sad, and bad? ### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMUNIQUE

### From CE Director, Ginny Westover

At just about the same time every year, two events take place that have become much looked forward to annual gatherings among the 18 and under population here at Lewistown Presbyterian Church. These two happenings look vastly different from each other in size, structure and student dynamics, but they share the same purpose: growing kids deeper in their relationship with Jesus. Here's a glimpse of what goes on at each.

During the first weekend of March each year, the downtown Harrisburg Hilton is overrun with around 500 teenagers and their leaders. IMPACT is the drawing card. This high energy youth conference is sponsored by Central Pennsylvania Youth Ministries (CPYM). Its name defines its purpose: to impact teens with the gospel of Jesus Christ; and, in turn, challenge teens to make an impact on their friends and family. This year, six of our youth and six youth from McVeytown Presbyterian traveled together to IMPACT.

We caravanned to the Hilton Friday evening. Once the registration process was completed and kids, suitcases, and snacks had found their assigned rooms, it was off to the first session of the weekend! Elevators morphed into sardine cans and stairways clogged with students until all converged on the main auditorium. Here, CPYM leaders Mark and Danny (who never grow old) got the kids pumped with crazy icebreakers and introduced the band. Hand clapping, foot stomping praise songs gave way to quieter worship before the speaker stepped onto the stage.

This year, California youth pastor, Neil Hoffman challenged the kids to push back against what culture says and push "pause" before acting on their feelings; always looking to the truth of God revealed in the Bible to define who they are and what really matters. Break-out seminars Saturday morning and afternoon reinforced Neil's message and gave lots of food for thought on other pertinent topics like relationships, addictions, technology and sharing your faith.

One of the highlights of the weekend was the time spent de-briefing together. Usually this was in the evening, after the sessions. There was good conversation and sharing about what God was impressing on hearts, followed by a time to pray together before heading to bed. It was also a time to see how our group contest was going. McVeytown's Youth leader, Dave, had put together a fun photo scavenger hunt that sent the kids all over the hotel. The result? Among other things, LPC Youth brought home a purple light-up cowboy hat (ask one of the Youth for the back story) and the prize winning team! Way to go, Annalise and Skyler!

The remaining challenge, of course, is for the kids to live out what they learned and keep what God did in the forefront of their thinking now that they're home. Here are a few thoughts about the weekend from some of our Youth: "Everyone was so nice and so open." "It was an inspiring, renewing, spiritual experience." "I am less shy about my faith now." "I feel closer to God." "It was exhilarating to feel the presence of God!" "I definitely developed a stronger bond with God after straying away." Please continue to pray for our Youth as they face daily pressures that challenge their commitment to Christ.

A number of the Youth jumped from IMPACT into helping with Kidz Klub, a weekly VBS-type program for the younger set. This year, the Christian Education Committee decided to combine two objectives into one and make Communion instruction a part of 2018's Lenten Kidz Klub. This necessitated coming up with our own curriculum. The result was "Living the Lord's Supper." For the past four weeks, an average of 14 children have been using their imaginations and stepping back into Bible times. The journey has taken them to Jerusalem for the annual Passover celebration. Along the way, the children have learned about God's first rescue of his people from slavery in Egypt. They've learned how the Israelites had to trust God and obey his directives to put blood of a slain lamb on their doorposts in order to be saved from death. They've stomped grapes and made bread without leaven in preparation for their own Passover meal. By the time this newsletter is published, the kids will have participated in Jesus' Last Supper and learned where our present day celebration of Communion began. They, along with their parents, will have had the opportunity to receive the sacrament. Through all of these weeks, our prayer and greatest desire has been for each child to see Jesus as the Lamb of God who died to take away their sin and to receive this amazing gift of life. This is the hope and aim of each lesson, each youth or children's program, and each family event here at Lewistown Presbyterian Church.

### SESSION NOTES

#### The regular meeting of the Session of the Lewistown Presbyterian Church was held 3/15/18, at 7:00 PM in the Baraca Room and accomplished the following:

- Pastor Thomas led opening devotions using Hebrews 10:19-25, followed by a time of joys and concerns along with prayer.
- Received thank you notes from Mifflin County Music Boosters for the use of the building and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for our contributions.
- Approved the use of the Baraca Room and Parlor for Art Classes to be held on Wednesdays beginning 4/4 and ending 5/9/18.
- Approved the use of kitchen and Baraca Room on Friday 2/8/19 from 12 N - 9:00 PM, Saturday 2/9/19 from 8:00 AM - 8:00 PM and Sunday 2/10/19 from 12 N - 6:00 PM.
- Approved repairs to the drainage outside of the parlor at the cost of \$5,520 using Cornerstone Waterproofing of Reedsville. Funds to be paid through the Capital Reserve.
- Acknowledged that Elder Karen McCurdy will be the Elder Commissioner at the 4/17/18 presbytery meeting to be held at the Milroy Church.
- Approved Bushman Landscaping to do the lawn service. Approved the removal of leaves and cleaning of beds, clean-up and installation of landscape fabric and river stone by the Third Street door, and adding soil and grass in front of the smaller sign.

- Acknowledged with gratitude the painting of the choir room.
- Approved church participation in the Faith Festival on Saturday, 5/19/18 from 10:00 AM – 2:00 PM.
- Approved an Adult Mission Trip to Puerto Rico for hurricane relief sometime in the fall of 2018. The exact dates and mission organization are yet to be decided.
- Agreed to sponsor one elementary or junior high student and one high school student through BuildingGuate's program of student sponsorship.
- Heard the progress of Lenten Kids Club and learned that 16 children have been participating. The Christian Education committee also reported the need for volunteers to participate in the Easter Family Event on March 31.
- Received the February Financial Report

- Approved allowing the Stewardship Committee to enter into a new lease for the office copier.
