## PASTOR'S PAGE

From Pastor James Thomas



By the time you are reading this, you are probably already aware of my recent announcement that I have taken a call to be the next pastor of the Ridley Park Presbyterian Church in Ridley Park, PA.

This new call will begin on August 1, so Devon and I will be moving in late July. That means, of course, that changes are coming to the Lewistown Presbyterian Church, too. Your session will keep you informed of next steps as you enter into a time of transition. The obvious goal of this transitional time is to find a new pastor to serve the Lewistown Presbyterian Church in the next phase of your ministry. But there are many other goals during the time of transition as well. The most important goal is to continue to worship and minister faithfully in Christ's name. I strongly encourage you to continue to support the life and ministry of the church with your time and energy, wisdom and effort, and with your tithes and offerings. During times of pastoral transition, there are gaps to be filled. Find out what you can do to help the church be the Church in this time. Also, do not forget to pray! There is a lot of discernment necessary at a time like this. God has good plans for Lewistown Presbyterian Church. Covenant together to prayerfully discern what those plans might be.

Huntingdon Presbytery will be available to assist you in this transition. General Presbyter, Joy Kaufmann, will preach here on August 5 to visibly represent the presbytery's support and help to outline the next steps. The Committee on Ministry will assign another local pastor the task of moderating your session until an interim pastor can be found. When the Pastor Nominating Committee is formed, the Committee on Ministry will provide a liaison between that committee and the Committee on Ministry to help to guide the discernment process and assure that everything is done "decently and in order."

Please believe me when I tell you that leaving this church and community is very difficult for Devon and me. We have a great life here! We have wonderful friends and family here! We serve an amazing church here!

But we believe that God is calling us to a new phase of our life together. I believe that ten years is a healthy tenure for a pastor. After that amount of time, ministry can get stale and energies wane. I do not want that for LPC! I think we've done great things together and I am grateful for what we have accomplished for the Kingdom of God. But it is time for something new for you as well as for us. Lewistown Presbyterian is a healthy, vibrant and active church made up of some of the most wonderful people I have ever met. Your future is bright!

Devon and I look forward to relishing these last few weeks with you. There is still ministry to be done, worship to be lifted to God, and friendship to be celebrated. I will also be working with the session to discern the next steps for the church. After I leave, however, it is important that any professional role I have had in the church be discontinued. I will not be permitted to discuss church business or pastoral concerns. But I hope that our personal friendships will continue.

In case your are wondering, Ridley Park is five miles from the Philadelphia airport and about fifteen miles from center city Philadelphia. Even with its proximity to the city, it has some small town elements that remind us of Lewistown. The position I've taken is that of co-pastor for a month or two so that I can work with the current pastor until he retires. The Presbytery of Philadelphia is using Ridley Park as an experiment to see if this model works. The goal of this model is to provide a smooth pastoral transition. Of course it only works when the outgoing pastor is retiring or otherwise leaving the ministry. In October, I will transition from co-pastor to pastor. ## HELLO SPRING

Now that spring has reluctantly arrived out here in Treaster Valley, we are joyfully welcoming several species of birds and other wildlife to our abode. A few wary chipmunks, that, so far, have avoided the claws and jaws of our three cats, play gleefully among the rocks and bushes. Our log house is awakened every morning with their songs and noise. It reminds us of the hymn:

This is my Father's world—The birds their carols raise."

Our rustic home provides many nesting places for our feathered guests. A robin family has returned to one of the beams of our front porch rafters. Just above our back door is a nest of a tufted titmouse. Two families of house wrens, which have built in hollowed out gourds, hang from tree branches. A mother Carolina wren has established her rather expansive nest in our shop/ storage building where she continuously scolds any person or car which comes near. Within a short period of time, some soft 'tweeting' indicates that new baby birds have hatched. A peek into the nests reveal the gaping mouths of four hungry babies, which their mother and father hasten to satisfy with a diet of bugs.

Baby birds are most unattractive with huge eyes and distended bellies and wings no bigger than matchsticks. They are a far cry from the graceful adult birds that we will be seeing and hearing throughout the summer. Our hymn states it this way: "All things bright and beautiful, all creatures great and small, all things wise and wonderful, the Lord God made them all. Each little flower that opens, each little bird that sings, God made their glowing colors. God made their tiny wings." (Cecil Frances Alexander—1848). So we see and enjoy all of God's creation.

In addition to the obvious benefits and blessings that we gain from the near proximity of our little feathered friends, there are life lessons of faith and providence which help us in our daily living. We observe how the environment for their homes is chosen and constructed to be safe and comfortable. We notice a rapid growth toward maturity and independence. Finally, each one grows into a life of personal responsibility.

Another timeless lesson is mentioned in the Bible: Matthew 6:25,26, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more important than food, and the body more important than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them." God care for them and also us!

The author, Victor Hugo has written this: "Be like the bird that, pausing in her flight a while on boughs too slight, feels them give way beneath her yet sings, know that she hath wings."

### From CE Director, Ginny Westover

At last, the days of winter are behind us! The time spent huddled under a fleece dreaming of all places warm and wonderful will soon come to fruition as our calendars fill with summer plans. As we block off days and weeks for vacations and gatherings I want to encourage and challenge us to also plan time to read the Bible. Most all followers of Jesus would agree that Bible reading is essential to growing deeper in our relationship with Him, but struggle to maintain the habit when schedules get busy or our time with God feels forced and dry. Like any worthwhile activity, it takes planning, practice and some personal push to get into a steady and sustainable rhythm. Summer is the perfect time to set some new goals in this area! Maybe your goal is for your own spiritual growth. Maybe you will want to determine to read the Bible as a family. Maybe both! Whatever the case, here

are three suggested areas to help in your planning. (because we all know that without a plan there will be no progress).

WHEN: When is the best time of day for you to spend a few minutes with God? There is no "right time." First thing in the morning works best for me, but I have a friend who reads her Bible during her lunch break, and another who spends time with God before going to bed at night. The important thing is to choose a time and then stick to it as much as you are able. Part of "when" is "for how long?" Again, no right or wrong. Be realistic. Start small with 5 or 10 minutes. Then push for a few more. The most important thing is **start**.

**WHERE:** Place is another important consideration. You'll want someplace quiet and

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free from distractions. That can be challenging with children up and around. I remember well the days of early morning tip-toeing downstairs, carefully avoiding the steps that creaked, to enjoy a few moments with Jesus (and a cup of coffee). Susanna Wesley (of Methodist renown) is said to have thrown her apron over her head to create her own private prayer "closet." Whatever your circumstance, press through and on! The benefits are beyond worth it!

WHAT: With 66 books to choose from in the Bible and more devotional options than anyone wants to count, the "what" of Bible reading can seem quite overwhelming. So, if you're in need of a "what" start small. If you want to read a book of the Bible, most people find the New Testament an easier read than the Old. The gospels are a good place to begin, as Matthew, Mark, Luke and John each focus on the life of Jesus. Read what you can in the time you allotted. Save a minute or two to quietly ponder what you read. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you understand. That's His job and He loves to open our minds and hearts to the truth that transforms us! Before I hit "send" I will leave you with a few devotional guide suggestions, both book and digital. Most books can be found at Friendship Bookstore or ordered online.

You can try it free for one week.



This icon represents You Version's Bible App for Kids. It is a free interactive Bible experience designed specifically to engage children with stories from the Bible. Easy to navigate through, kids will love the touch-activated

animations, colorful illustrations and special activities and challenges that go along with each Bible story. Find it at your device's app store.



Here's the adult/teen app. Also free, this is a treasure trove of Bible study and devotional materials. You can choose from a plethora of plans that are designed to help you explore a

## NATURAL CHURCH DEVELOPMENT

#### From Pastor Thomas on Behalf of the Church Health Team

Our latest Natural Church Development survey indicates that we are much like the children of Prairie Home Companion's Lake Wobegon, where "all the women are strong, all the men are good looking, and all the children are above average!" The results of the survey we administered last month put us above the average for all of the eight Natural Church Development categories of church health!

If you remember how the Natural Church Development concept works, you will remember that a church is only as strong as it's weakest category. The image of a barrel is used to demonstrate that it can only hold water up to the level of it's lowest stave. Your church health team is very pleased that our numbers in the surveys we have taken over the last three



years have risen in most categories, particularly in those which were below average.

Of the eight key characteristics of healthy churches, we have consistently been strong on Holistic Small Groups, Empowering Leadership and Effective Structures. We have consistently been above average in Gift-based ministry and Inspiring Worship Services. We faced our greatest

the category of Need-Oriented gains in Evangelism. We believe this growth was due to our commitment to Traveling Day Camp and the Community Outreach facet of the 40 Days of Community Campaign.

Our weakest characteristics, Loving Relationships and Passionate Spirituality continue to be challenges to us even though we have improved significantly in each category. While we now score above average on both of these categories, we are just above average on each. Passionate Spirituality, which was our focus last year improved seven points, but is still our weakest at 52%. Of course, we acknowledged that this is a typically low-scoring measure for Presbyterians. We tend to keep our faith in our minds and hands in thought and outreach rather than in our hearts and emotions. However, as we looked at models of Christian life in both scripture and in church history, we discovered that God desires that we engage our hearts and emotions in our worship and service. Church growth experts have found that churches whose members are excited about their faith attract new members!

While we are at the end of the three-year Natural Church Development process, your Church Health Team hopes that LPC will continue to seek to engage our emotions in order to increase our passion for God and our love for each other.

Krislund Traveling Day Camp is returning to Lewistown Presbyterian for the third consecutive summer of ministry this July!
