Every fall, just about six weeks into the new school year at our little one room school, when it was beginning to look as though our educational process would deteriorate into terminal boredom, something happened to bring fresh vitality to our student body. Our teacher, Miss Sarah Wiggins, would announce that on the last Friday of October we would have a Halloween Party. This announcement would bring forth a season of great excitement. Hundreds of sheets of black construction paper would be cut into patterns of black cats, witches, and other appropriate shapes. The most popular designs would show a black cat on a picket fence and the form of a witch riding a broom across the face of a harvest moon. Girls would begin to wear colorful ribbons in their hair, and the boys would begin to construct all sorts of noise makers with which they thought they might scare people.



advantage of catching the apples with their teeth. Then there was the old "eat five crackers and be the first to whistle game." A talent show of a sort took place with the lower grade kids doing simple acrobatics with a broomstick or a jump rope. Some of the older students would recite "pieces" or read appropriate poetry. The four girls in my class

would try to imitate radio personalities whom they had heard. One girl played a guitar and belted out a heart breaking rendition of "Old Shep." Then there would be cider and a cookie for everyone. After about an hour of such activities we were dismissed to go home. Although it was not spelled out for us, the lessons of the day for us were: 1) Have fun, but do not make fun of others 2) Help one another and share 3) Respect your elders...and 4) Be home before dark.

On the day of our party, we would be dismissed early for our lunch so we could run home and get our costumes and return to the school for the festivities. Many of the costumes consisted of a simple paper bag pulled down over a person's face. A lot of the boys would tie a bandana over their face to look like a desperate outlaw. Girls concentrated on movie star style hairdos and more ribbons.

Among the games we played were "find the eraser" which our teacher would hide in plain sight. Apples would be hung from the stage curtain wire. Bigger boys and tall girls had the

Costumes and masks did not hide any identities. It was known that the Pringles and Beckers came over Jimtown Hill, the Goodwins used the main Dawson road, the Zorns and McKnights would arrive by the Cemetery lane. We were all known by the roads we traveled.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

"Your call has been forwarded..." "If you want to leave a call-back number..." How many times a day do you hear these references to "call"? While we're in the realm of phone calls, there is also the "missed-call" and the "sales call." In the critter kingdom: "birdcall" and "call of the wild." If you're in a medical practice, "Call Central" can replace your old answering service with a fully automated system. We've all encountered the advertiser's "call to action" (*buy now; click here*). In the Bible, Abraham's call sent him on a journey of over a

thousand miles; 80 year old Moses received his "call" from a burning bush; Samuel was just a kid trying to sleep, and Jeremiah hadn't even made it out of his mother's womb! New Testament Saul received an audible "call." It was a "call" that brought Pastor Jim to us a decade ago and a new "call" that most recently led him and Devon to Ridley Park. And, now, as we enter into a season of transition in our church, we pray for our Pastor Nominating Committee as they seek to discern who God would "call" to serve here. We could

easily call it all quite confusing, shake our heads and call it quits when it comes to sorting out the meaning of the term... but we are called to a higher standard. When we live into this call and act out of this call toward each other and the world we are living life as God intended and will be the Church he wants us to be.

Just what is this "call"? Does every individual have one? Do I? Do you? Do we? Only certain clergy? What does one do with a "call"?

Can a "call" be missed? Ignored? Will God leave a voicemail? What does the Bible have to say about this intriguing term? How does "call" affect us and why should we care?

Most biblical commentators connect the concept of "call" with three different categories: worship, election, and vocation. As I looked at each, I was especially encouraged by the election connection. (after all, we *are* Presbyterians!) There is much that could be said about election and call, but I want to focus on one element in particular; one that was a familiar preaching theme during the summer. That element is "identity".

According to scholar Stephen Motyer, "In both Hebrew and Greek, 'call' can be used in the sense of 'naming' (Gen 2:19; Lk 1:13). In biblical thought to give a name to something or someone was to bestow an identity. Names often encapsulated a message about the person concerned (Ruth 1:20-21; John 1:42). When God is the one who bestows names, the action is almost equivalent to creation: "Who created all these? He who brings out the starry host one by one, and calls them each by name... (Is 40:26)."

The disciples' identities were changed when Jesus said, "I no longer call you servants...instead I have called you friends" (John 15:15). Peter describes the identity of believers in Jesus as, "royal priests, a holy nation, God's very own possession" because God "called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light." I mentioned Paul's plea to the group of believers at Ephesus reminding them of their identity in last month's Panorama. His words still ring in my mind: "I beg

you to lead a life worthy of your calling, for you have been called by God." This identity, this "calling", is both individual and corporate. When a person receives the forgiveness of sin that Christ offers, that person is transformed; he or she is a new creation, moving from darkness to light; no longer dead in sin, but alive in Christ; a child of God's! As well as receiving a new individual identity, this person receives a new family identity: he or she belongs to the body of Christ; the

family of God. This, too, is a transforming experience. So transforming, in fact, that Jesus said the world will identify people who love each other as Christ loved as belonging to Him. (Jn 13:35)

Paul takes the first three chapters of his letter to the Ephesian believers to spell out the specifics of this new identity. I'll name just a few and encourage you to check out the rest in your Bible. "...God loved us and chose us in Christ to be holy and without fault in his eyes...decided in advance to adopt us into his own family...identified us as his own by giving us the Holy Spirit...made us a holy temple where he lives by his Spirit..." (NLT) And, so much more! This is who we are as believers in Christ! This is our call: each of us individually and all of us together. It is an amazing and powerful identity. May we continue to live into this call and live our lives from this call, so that we can continue to grow into the church God wants us to be.

"Therefore, I...beg you to lead a life worthy of your calling, for you have been called by God. Always be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love. Make every effort to keep yourselves united in the Spirit, binding yourselves together with peace. For there is one body and one Spirit, just as you have been called to one glorious hope for the future."

FAMILIES OF THE WEEK

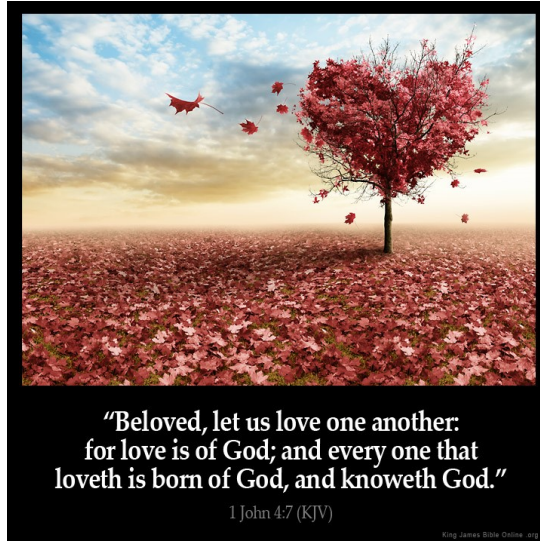
To get to know each other better, we asked our families of the week to tell us about themselves:

THE DAYTECS

Francis and Leah Daytec are our missionaries in the Philippines. Please remember to pray for them as they minister there.



These are full days in the Daytec home, family, ministry... full, overflowing, and good. The last several months for us have been full of life, home-schooling, hosting teams, sickness, outreaches, laughter, tears, messiness, purposeful moments, sharing our home with wonderful people, walking through brokenness, deaths, healing, life and bondage-breaking with so many incredible friends. I feel some days that our walls are elastic, growing to accommodate anyone who comes to our door. There is always room, there is always enough. I say this often to myself, when I am tempted to think there is not. I saw a quote a few months ago that said, "When you have more than you need, build a longer table, not a higher fence." I realize now that "more than you need" is actually much less than most people realize. Quite often it seems like we may not have enough even for ourselves, and we're led to share, to give away, and then we find that there is more than enough. It's God's lavish and generous kingdom-culture in action, being applied to our lives and changing us.

Our word for this year is "Salty" as in Matthew 5:13 salty. We are called the salt of the earth, but if salt isn't salty anymore, what good is it? Our daily goal is not in doing, but in abiding in the Heart of our Father, keeping our eyes fixed on Him as we do our best to season, preserve, thaw, and make-thirsty-for Living-Water the world around us. Francis and I have been pouring into our team for nine years, discipling, loving, and walking through healing in their lives, knowing that the benefits are not just for them, but for all the people they will love through this ministry. This year has been a new season of seeing growth and fruit coming out of their lives powerfully, and in the past four months there has been a new incredible outpouring of the Holy Spirit over them. Together we are speaking at conferences and churches, walking through the red-light district to love and pray over people, going into hospitals to speak life, blessing, and healing over the broken.

Our team is made up of formerly broken, abused, abandoned, addicted, afraid and insecure people who have (some very recently) experienced healing from the heart of The Father. They have been transformed into healed, whole, healthy, secure, radiant, bold children of God. As they pray over

women in prostitution, men who buy women, the dying, the lame, the blind, the demon-possessed, the broken—We are seeing healing. Healing of hearts, spirits, diseases, bodies. We have Bible-studies throughout the week, home-church on Sundays, and see patients daily in the clinic, delivering lots of babies, and also seeing patients in the nearby villages.

This has also been a season of grieving, as my (Leah) Nana went to be with Jesus a few months ago.

She is an incredible, Jesus-loving woman who is also one of my dearest friends. I did not get to be with her for the last two years of her life, and that was very difficult on her and on me. Being away from people I love as they transition from earth to heaven is really rough.. grief becomes disjointed and It's hard to not be able to grieve with the rest of my family. Jesus knows.

Justice has had multiple hospital stays in the past few months with what looks like Pneumonia and difficulty breathing. Chest x-rays showing enlarged Hilar and Para-Tracheal lymph nodes, typically indicative of primary Tuberculosis. Docs are 99% sure. We've prayed over him, tested blood and done repeat x-rays this past week (waiting for results before sending this update). His x-ray shows what doctors are sure is TB but his skin and blood tests are negative for TB. It may be that his body is just not producing antibodies against the disease and that is why we are not seeing positive results. We plan to start treatment this coming week—it is an intense 6-9 month regimen of multiple chemo-like meds. TB is very, very common here, and we are regularly exposed in the kind of tribal ministry that we do in both inviting people to share our home and lives, and going to their homes in the tribal villages. This is not something we haven't thought through or that we regret; It is part of the risk of the lives we live. We pray continuously over our children, do the very best we can to protect them and, ultimately, trusting the faithful hands and heart of our Father to hold all of us, and He does. In it all, He is so good. Thank you for praying for him—please keep it up.

I cannot say it enough. We could not be here doing what we are without you. You are such a valuable part of our team, integral pieces in this ministry. Thank you for loving us, praying for us, remembering us, and giving financially to keep us on the field.
