MEET OUR NEW INTERIM PASTOR



Rev. Sarah Sedgwick will begin as our church's new interim pastor on October 1, 2019. Sarah will be our interim pastor as our church's Pastor Nominating Committee continues its search for a long-term, installed pastor.

Rev. Sedgwick has been pastor of First United Presbyterian Church in DuBois, Pennsylvania for the last nine years, ably serving their congregation much as she will serve ours. Before coming to First United Presbyterian Church, she was youth director at Faith Presbyterian

Church in Indianapolis, Indiana for six years. She graduated from Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, and won a prize for showing the most promise in serving small churches with effective Biblical preaching and compassionate pastoral involvement.

Sarah is very committed to local community mission work, and was attracted to Lewistown Presbyterian Church partly because of our local community outreach. While serving in DuBois, she led the creation of The Red Mission House, an outreach ministry of First United Presbyterian Church that offers housing for work teams helping in the DuBois area. She also helped found The Soul Platter Café in DuBois, which provides food for people and asks people to pay what they can.

Sarah comes highly recommended as caring, compassionate, and friendly, among other outstanding qualities. She believes in the priesthood of all believers—all of us have opportunities to lead worship, pray, teach and minister to the world around us. She feels called to churches that appreciate their past, are grateful for their present situation, and are excited about their future.

Sarah's first Sunday with our church will be October 6, World Communion Sunday. We hope that you will come to worship at our church at 10:30, take part in the Lord's Supper with fellow church members and friends, and meet our new interim pastor. We will look forward to seeing you then.

The recent cleaning and replacement of the bulbs in our lighting fixtures has greatly improved the illumination in our church sanctuary (you did notice the difference, didn't you?). That happenstance brings to my memory a similar incident in our former parish.

Carol and I and our family lived for 25 years at the address of 198 Main Street in the river town of Tidioute, PA. I served as pastor of the Presbyterian Church and Carol was employed as the secretary to the principal of the K-12 Tidioute public school. The Presbyterian Church was built in 1893 and reflected the prosperity and opulence of the area at that time. The Allegheny River, in close proximity to the church, was often crowded bank to bank with oil barges and timber log rafts. In fact, less than 100 yards from the church was the home of a prosperous oil well developer. He, and his partners, actually sold their holding to the Rockefeller family, which became one of the origins of the Exxon Corporation, of which we are all aware.

With such vast resources available it was fitting that the Presbyterian Church should be a very ornate building, both inside and out. To this date, it still houses an actively worshipping congregation.

Originally the sanctuary was lighted with gas lamps. Pipes which provided this utility are still in evidence in the walls of the rooms. The building was finally electrified and low sconces were installed at the lower congregational level.

The main lighting for the sanctuary was provided by a huge five glass bowl chandelier. This lighting unit could only be serviced by lowering the whole unit down to the floor of the sanctuary by means of a winch and cable.

The utilization of the building for worship was similar to what we have here at LPC. The chancel, pulpit, choir loft and organ were located in one corner of the room. Come worship time, the mixed and intergenerational choir would robe themselves in the office area. They would pass through the large social room, the kitchen, and enter to their places in

front of an ancient "tracker" pipe organ and behind the large pulpit.

Things usually went well with our worship experience until suddenly, it seemed that there was a "sour" note coming from the choir loft. It was not a musical dissonance, but rather an exclamation of outrage by one of the choir ladies. She certainly deserved to voice her opinion as she had been a choir member from her teens well into her 90's. The reason for exasperation was that one of the light bulbs in the central chandelier had burned out. And, of course, it was the one nearest the choir loft. Her repeated hints, requests and demands fell on deaf ears. Every Sunday the errant bulb hung in mocking darkness.

Something had to be done! Finally, an unnamed culprit locked all the doors, climbed into the attic, cranked down the fixture and replaced the worthless bulb, and replaced all five. Suddenly he realized that there would be absolutely no fun in only restoring the light to its former state. (Who would know?) Then, with a perverse mischief, a plan was devised. All the globes were cleaned and replaced with new bulbs, but in the globe closest to the choir a 3 lb. coffee can lid was fashioned into a "smiley face."... It was not just a usual smiley face; with tin snips this face displayed a winking eye. Then the light was hoisted to its original place, high above the congregation.

The next Sunday as the choir came into their places, someone looked up and nudged the next singer. Soon others became aware of the winking face. Everyone in the church was smiling (except one).

As we learned at our church on August 18, church is a good place in which to be happy. **So Smile.**

And we read in Psalm 2:4. "He who sits in the heavens laughs."
