SHEILA'S SOLUTION

As the Christian world continues through the Lenten Season in preparation for the glorious Easter Sunday, we attend services, participate in studies and spiritually prepare ourselves with prayer and for some, fasting, I am reminded of a particular incident which remains in mind in spite of the passing years.

During the twenty-five years of our ministry in Lake Erie Presbytery, Carol and I and our three children lived in a small town in Warren County. The parish consisted of two churches located at sixteen miles distance from each other. We lived in the town which had the larger congregation and that provided a manse.

It was a town with many blessings, not the least of which was the location of five churches on or near its Main Street. The Presbyterian church was our charge and our family home. Its location was near the center of town and was quite an ornate frame building with beautiful stained glass windows. It had been built by the contributions of prosperous business people who had gained their wealth from the oil and timber resources of the area. Just a short distance from the Presbyterian church, a large brick Methodist church was built, and dueling church bells could be heard every Sunday morning. Within the same block, a more humble little church housed the Baptist congregation. A shortened pew from that church now sits on our front porch out here in Treaster Valley. A unique feature of the Baptist church was that sometimes they held baptisms in the river which flowed near their back door (remember, 'O Brother Where Art Thou'?).

Just on the next block on a parallel street was the Roman Catholic church. It's fine facilities were often used for ecumenical functions. Still further up Main Street there was a small Free Methodist Church. At the time of our tenure in the town, they had a pastor who was blind. He had a large guide dog which was always at his side. One time at a

community service, held in the Presbyterian Church, the dog assisted the worship with a most welcome antiphonal expression that I have never observed in all the years of my attendance in church services.

One evening service there were three ministers on the Chancel of our church. I was there as host Pastor, the guest speaker was a retired Methodist district superintendent, and our sightless neighbor Pastor with his guide dog sleeping at his feet. As the long sermon continued beyond all expectations, the dog awoke and looked at the preacher, yawned, then lay back down to sleep. But the Pastor still continued. The dog was ever endeared by the townsfolk.

But the most memorable incident that I am reminded of every year is this. It was at the Ash Wednesday service at the Catholic Church. It was open to all of the townsfolk who chose to attend. Our nearest neighbors were parents of three young girls, the youngest of whom may have been only three years old. According to the custom, ashes were imposed upon all who wished to participate. All went well until after the service when little Sheila disappeared into the crowd. A frantic search found her at the holy water font vigorously rubbing her forehead with a damp Kleenex. She proudly announced, "Look, Mommy, I got it almost all washed off." She had probably never heard of original sin or total depravity. All she knew was that a little girl in a pretty dress should not have a dirty face. Perhaps in her childlike innocence she truly discovered the meaning of prayer and fasting to cleanse us all from sin.

The distinguishing mark... The tell-tale sign... A badge of honor, of sorts. Until that conversation I hadn't given much thought to this faded patch of cloth but now my eyes seem drawn there and I find myself looking for others who wear the same. More important than the mark itself is the story behind how it got there. I hadn't



given much thought to that either, until our recent study of <u>Were You There</u>? But I'm getting ahead of myself.

"That" initial conversation took place nearly a year ago when the members of the Christian Ed Committee were setting up for the Family Easter Event. Leah R. and I were lugging backdrops and chatting. "Where did you find such cute and comfy pants? Looks like you can wear them with anything!", I remarked to Leah as we hauled too big cardboard through too small door. "Walmart, I think. I needed to find something for work. All my other pants are so worn out at the knees."

Hmmm... "worn out at the knees" ...my mind's eye went immediately to my own preschool teacher wardrobe. The right knee of most of my pants was definite a lighter tone than the left. "Yep...seems to be part of the uniform...comes with the territory," I thought to myself. The reason for the worn out pant knee is easy to figure out. If you spend any amount of time working with young children you know how much of a day you spend down on one or both knees. It doesn't' take too long for friction to wear and fade the fabric. The "why" is more important than the "how," though. Theoretically, one's pant knees could remain the same color that they were at the time of purchase if one choose to remain unbending or make the children stretch loose shoe laces, tricky puzzle pieces, unwieldy pencils and skinned knees up to you. However, most people I know who are physically able and intent on interacting well with children want to get down to the child's level. The purpose is to get eye to eye with the child; to show him or her our face instead of our navel; communicate a level playing field and put our personhoods on an equal plane. It's intentional positioning for serving VS. controlling and а nonverbal means to communicate value and respect. The message is "You and


I... we're equal; not in terms of life experience or responsibilities, but in intrinsic worth and dignity." In the famous words of Horton the elephant, "A person's a person, no matter how small."

Essentially, the "why behind the worn pant knee is "empathy"; the ability to take the perspective of another person; to see life from their eyes; to feel with another. And here is where my thoughts turned to our current Lenten study, Were You There? From Day 1 we have been challenged to put ourselves in the "shoes" of a slave. To do this we must stay out of judgement (not easy!) and recognize the emotion of those writing/singing the spirituals. In order to make a connection we have to connect with something in ourselves that knows that emotion. It is a vulnerable, often painful and frightening, arduous task! Chapter questions have asked us to examine individual and collective attitudes and experiences of prejudice and injustice and to recognize our own need of salvation and deliverance. The small group discussions have been challenging and meaningful responses. By the time this goes to print we will be halfway through our Lenten journey. The good news of the cross and empty tomb is ever before, with the promise of forgiveness redemption and motivation to be ministers of reconciliation in our neighborhood and in our world. Come Easter Sunday, perhaps we will all wear pants with faded knees, fabric worn thin from bending to the ground with humble prayers of repentance and praise.

ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING


Palm Sunday, April 14




DAILY DEVOTIONALS FOR YOU

The children built hand bridges with each other demonstrating that love connects us all.


We started February off with meeting magical characters in: The Frog Prince, The Princess and the Pea, and The Elves and the Shoemaker. Castle creations, mattress stacking and leaping over numbers like frogs all added to the magic of the moments. Week two had the children exploring a variety of stories in

the form of a song (ballad), some filled with exaggeration (folktale), and some that give an explanation of a phenomenon (fable). In the read aloud: Froggie Went a Courtin' students dressed-up and role played the wedding of Froggie and Miss Mouse. Love was definitely in the air!

Valentine bags were prepared with cards distributed with much fanfare. It was memorable to see the amount of precise attention students gave to handwritten notes to their fellow classmates. Pastor Cindy came into the classroom and read: Run Away Bunny reinforcing God's forever love.

Wacky Wednesday turned out to be wacky indeed. Building tinker toys on a upside down table was wacky. Making green eggs and ham was wacky. Mrs. Westover's hair color matched the green eggs and ham, talk about wacky. But the creativity was awesome!


As the month continued around school delays and cancellations we learned about the nuts and bolts of machinery. Sawing cardboard

She did not concern herself with our yearly budget or how great the cost—she simply used her talent and got started with what *she could do*. She presented her first 'installment' of her fundraiser to Shelter Services last week and promises there will be more to come. What talent are you using to bless others?

PEACE OF MIND

Thanks to Kish Electrical, Allensville Mennonite Church and Anna Dale Thomson Foundation, Shelter Service has been able to bring our fire safety system into the modern world.

We so appreciate all that care for, and help meet the needs of, the homeless. It has added immense peace of mind to all of us that our emergency system has been upgraded and is fully functioning.

2018 HIGHLIGHTS

We were able to serve 211 persons in 2018 with housing, clothes, food, toiletries, case management and referrals.

- Three more persons were given three-day hotel stays because their background deemed them ineligible for a family shelter
- Eleven additional were given transportation to return to their hometown
- 46 others were from out of the area and were giving 30 day housing and helps
- 10 were Huntingdon County residents
- 25 were residents of Juniata County
- 115 were Mifflin County citizens. Two individuals with limited mobility and one sight impaired individual were able to be served thanks to a new fold out couch on our first floor

We also housed 5 families after their apartment building burnt down. Our Thrift Store was also able to provide household supplies to help them start over in other homes. Along with Rhodes Memorial Church, we were able to provide a family of six with a washing machine and bless nine other families with Christmas dinners and gifts for their children for Christmas. We were also able to equip the Shelter kitchen with a new range. The residents and staff say a big—THANK YOU!

Because of private funds, designated by the donors, we gave over \$12,000.00 to prevent homeless crises. Shelter Service delivered oil to five households with children; prevented eviction for four families by assisting with a utility bill, helped the needy pay for life sustaining, physician prescribed medications, provided transportation to medical appointments, and purchased work equipment such as steel-toe boots for new employment.

Unfortunately, the need continues:

We had to replace a furnace, repair plumbing, restore a damaged floor, replace a door... and on it goes.

It is thanks to the citizens, businesses, agencies, churches and caring community members that we can confidently say—"We have been able to serve so many needy citizens because of your support!"

SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

The Session met on February 14 and March 3, 2019, heard reports and discussed ministry issues, including:

- It was reported that the current membership of the church is 229.
- Heard that the staff is compiling an Operation's Manual for the Church.
- Approved for following:
 - Pastor's Continuing Education and Vacation.
 - Lenten Program using "Were You There" by Luke Powery. Kidz Klub is being planned to correspond to sermon series based on Exodus.
 - Collecting the One Great Hour of Sharing offering on 3/10/19.
 - Paying the registration fee for the Youth Triennium using Session Funds
- Preschool registrations for next year are being received and the Committee is looking into extending this year's school year for the snow makeup days for the classes.
- Dates have been set for the Community Vacation Bible School to be held at First Methodist Church from 6/23 - 6/27/19.
- The Faith Festival will be held in conjunction with Kid Connection (4/27/19 from 9:00 AM 3:00 PM) The Mission and Evangelism Committee will host the church booth.
- At a Special Meeting on March 3rd, Session reviewed and approved the Mission Study prepared by the Pastor Nominating Committee. It will be submitted to Presbytery COM for approval.


