THE LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

For me, one of the greatest joys of the Christmas season is watching again, and again, the annual classic entitled, "A Christmas Story." It is based on a book written by Jean Shepherd and tells of a little boy's quest for the most desirable Christmas gift that any boy could ever desire: a Red Ryder, lever action, one thousand shot carbine air rifle (B.B. gun) with a compass in the stock. I feel a very close affinity with Ralphie and his wish. Actually, we were very much alike in both era and environment. My childhood was also peopled with bullies and braggers and loving mothers and compassionate teachers. I can even remember driving a big Oldsmobile like the one that Ralphie's family owned. Abandoned cars and broken wooden fences were in view every time we town. Coal-fired furnaces marauding neighborhood dogs were also a part of our experience.

Miss Wiggins, our one-room, 8th grade school teacher wisely never encouraged us to announce and compare what we wished to receive for Christmas. In our own family of seven kids, "hinting" was definitely discouraged. Santa, aka Mamma and Daddy, knew what we needed and what was good for us. However, one year I audaciously broke the "no hinting" rule and made my heart's desire known in several ways. I had seen in one of the pages of the Boys Life magazine a most wonderful prospective gift. It was a khaki colored 2-cell flashlight with the lens attached at a 90 degree angle and a belt clip on the back. Like Ralphie, who needed the air rifle to fend off the terrible Black Bart, I began to build the case that I should be blessed with such a magnificent gift. I took what I thought was a reasonable course of action. I started early and made many (not so subtly) inferences as to how it would be good for me to have this flashlight.

Our farmhouse had been wired for electricity the same year that I was born. Other buildings, such as the barn, the chicken and pig houses, were not wired. To visit those facilities to carry feed and water in the early morning or evening darkness it was necessary to carry a kerosene lantern. I casually mentioned that if I had the flashlight clipped to my belt, with my hands free, I could carry both the feed and the water in the same trip. Also, nocturnal visits to the little necessary building in our backyard could be made

more safely with a lights. Then, there was the safety factor. A battery-powered flashlight was not likely to be tipped over and start a fire (remember Mrs. O'Leary's cow). Or if some varmint should sneak into the hen house with villainous intent, the flashlight and our old "22" could quickly discourage the raider.

Imagine my joy on a Christmas morning. I opened the tightly wrapped cylinder and found the prize—the flashlight with the angled-head and the belt clip. To this day, I can remember running out the front door and pointing the light at our big old elm tree, the tallest tree on the farm. The shaft of light penetrated the darkness and illuminated the tree to the highest branches. I knew then and there that I would have to prove the inestimable value of such a light. I believe that in the year that followed, it fulfilled my greatest expectations.

I kept the light hanging on a nail behind our kitchen door and never went out in the darkness without it. It accompanied me to do the feeding, to chase raccoons and rats away from the corn crib, and to go out to the woods to see what our old dog had treed. As winter faded into spring, and I began to travel by bicycle, I clipped the light to the basket at the front of the bike and safely navigated the rough country lane where we lived. Several years later, as I acquired my first car, I carried that light. If one or both of the headlights would go out, I could see which fuse to wrap with chewing gum foil to restore the circuit. Then there were flat tires. The light could be set upright and would shine on the wheel that had to be changed. Again, the ubiquitous light came to the rescue and the task was safely completed. I kept and used that flashlight for many years. It continued to dispel darkness and guide my way.

Locations and situations change but in every age and place there are fearsome shadows. In our personal lives there may be perplexing problems which seem to darken our future. And we are certainly aware of the many world-wide conflicts and disasters which cloud the way ahead for all humanity. But Christ gives us hope. It is as if we all have received a magnificent gift. It is a light to guide us through the days and years ahead; a light which can shine to the top of the highest mountain and across the widest ocean and to the branches of the tallest trees.




