'Tis the season for packages! The UPS and FedEx trucks are shifting into high gear, anticipating hours of deliveries during the holiday season. Where do your favorite packages come Amazon, Omaha Steaks, from? Pepperidge Farms, Indian River... Domino's?! Who doesn't like to find a box waiting on their front porch? Right now there are 20 boxes stacked in neat columns on top of the coat racks in the church office hallway waiting to be picked up and delivered to your front door! Don't be fooled by pizza-style appearance: pepperonis to be found inside these boxes! What you will find is everything you need to celebrate Advent and prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth. Advent in a Box is not just for kids, either! Adults and teens will enjoy the contents just as much as the younger set. So, make sure you stop by the church during office hours (8:30-3:30 Monday-Friday) and pick up a box! While you're getting yours, why not grab a box for a friend or neighborhood family? It's a great way to share the true meaning of Christmas!

Here's what you'll find in your box: A letter of welcome and instruction and six separate bags, each containing different parts of the Advent celebration. There's a bag on top with instructions and materials to make an Advent wreath and a bag on the bottom to get you started on a Hot Chocolate Gratitude party. In between, you'll find four other bags; one for each week of Advent. Each bag holds a booklet with scriptures, devotions, a real life story, a hands-on activity and outreach ideas. Included are all the materials you'll need for the hands on activity (with the exception of a few common household items). Set aside one day for everything or spread out the contents over the entire week. Choose what pieces and what time works best for you! Over the course of the next four weeks we'll be taking a deeper look into the Advent themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love. Activities using Orbeez (water gel beads), bubbles, balloons, glow sticks and more will make the learning even more fun! Although we won't be meeting in person during the weeks of Advent, the Tuesday night small group and the Youth group will be meeting online via Zoom. Beginning December 1, "Who Needs Christmas?" is the question that the Tuesday night small group will be discovering the answer to via Zoom from 6:30–8:00 PM. "Who Needs Christmas?" with Andy Stanley, is the title of the video series we will be using. You can find it on Right Now Media. We will be watching the videos together as a group and then enjoying discussion about the content afterwards.

Youth in grades 6-12 will be viewing and discussing an Advent video series on Right Now Media called "The Christmas Experience". This engaging set of six videos combines drama and teaching from Kyle Idleman to help us uncover often overlooked details of the Christmas story and bring to light the wonder of God's redemptive plan through Jesus Christ. There will be time for Christmas fun and games, too, all on Zoom from 6:00–7:30 PM.

We are all about to experience Advent as a church family in ways that are very different from what we've experienced in past years. What will God show us? What new opportunities to serve him will he give to us? Who will he bring into our lives that needs the Christmas message of hope, peace, joy, and love that can only be found in a relationship with Jesus Christ? How will we respond?

I believe that the Spirit of God has led the Christian Education Committee to the resources described in this article. It is our hope and prayer that each will be a means of drawing us into a deeper relationship of love with Jesus, our families, and each other. May God richly bless you as you prepare for and celebrate the birth of Jesus and anticipate his return!

#### SEEKING SILENCE

"How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given!
So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of His heaven."
O Little Town of Bethlehem ~ Phillips Brooks, 1868

It would seem to be a contradiction, wouldn't it, to speak about or consider "The Sound of Silence" during the most joyous time of the year. We share an almost insatiable longing to hear the bells ring, and the choirs sing; and we are caught up in an almost infectious joining (for better or worse) in the sounds and songs of the season. All of this is good!, very good! but I would suggest that we miss so much of the meaning of Christmas if we do not also listen for the significant silence of the season which carries a meaning "too deep for words." Simon and Garfunkel describe the situation this way: "And in the naked light I saw ten thousand people, maybe more, people talking without speaking—people hearing without listening—people writing songs that voices never share, and no one dare disturb the sound of silence." Not everyone shares in the often boisterous sounds of Christmas which it seems we enjoy. (or is it endure?) It was the NOISE!, NOISE!, NOISE! Of the citizens of Whoville that instigated the Grinch to pursue his path of evil treachery.

I must confess that in my memory there hangs a remorse cloud of "Grinchyness" for a momentary digression into a depth of feeling which would be unworthy for a minister, or any of us. It was a cold evening, just before Christmas as I was visiting Carol in the Allegheny General Hospital in Pittsburgh on a sad and personal mission. Our firstborn son had just been born and had lived only for twelve hours. As the elevator travelled to the floor of my destination, a very vociferous passenger stated his opinion to his captive audience. As we arrived at one particular floor, the opening door revealed a group of carolers from the local city churches. Our fellow visitor continued his complaint. I remember his bitter words to this very day,-- "Why do they allow all of those noisy people in here? Don't they know that there are sick people here?" For one frightening moment, to my regret, I felt myself agreeing with him.

Many Christmas seasons have come and gone since then. Thankfully, in all of those years, I have never experienced any reason to complain or disrespect any sound that speaks of the joy of Christmas (even rummy-tum-tum). As the sounds of this year's Christmas fade from our hearing and memories, I would suggest that we seek the several silences that may still speak volumes. One of them may be a pulpit—any pulpit, in any church simply because it exists. Because of the small dimensions of our Western Seminary, our

graduation ceremonies were held in the East Liberty Presbyterian Church. While awaiting the start of the rehearsals, my classmates and I had the opportunity to search out all of the nooks and crannies of that magnificent sanctuary.

The pulpit of carved marble was built high above the chancel. It could only be reached by climbing a circular stairway. When any of us curious future pastors would do so, we would be faced by an inscription, "WE WOULD SEE JESUS." And, isn't that what every church pulpit speaks in silent admonition? It does not matter if that pulpit be in a gigantic cathedral or in a lowly chapel. The silent, but profound statement must be heard and heeded: "WE WOULD SEE JESUS!" A hymn written by J. Edgar Park in 1913 states it this way, "We would see Jesus, lo! His star is shining, Above the stable where the angels sing; There in a manger on the hay reclining, Haste may we lay our gifts before the King."

Change the scene now to a home where there stands an empty chair, a phone that doesn't ring and there lies a tear stained handkerchief of a parent, a spouse or a child and the quiet emptiness shouts: "THIS SHOULD NOT BE!" Turn now to a sterile room where there is an electric monitor in view and a modulating sound fades into a steady monotone and then silence. Then we know! We know! And the silence speaks what we do not want to hear. But even here the Christmas message sound loud and clear: "Jesus said 'I am the resurrection and life; he who believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and whoever lives and believes in me shall never die" (Jn. 11:25-26)

In another favorite Christmas story, we find the wicked Grinch waiting in his lair listening to hear the weeping and wailing of sadness from all of the Whos because he had stolen all of their presents, toys, decorations and food. But he heard no such thing. Instead, he heard a song of joy...

#### "WELCOME CHRISTMAS!"

So, let us who experience the many silent hours of our lives, hear the wise words of Dr. Seuss: "CHRISTMAS DAY IS IN OUR GRASP, SO LONG AS WE HAVE HANDS TO CLASP!"

"JOY TO THE WORLD! THE LORD IS COME. LET EARTH RECEIVE HER KING

LET EVERY HEART PREPARE HIM ROOM, AND HEAVEN AND NATURE SING. AMEN!

#### PRESBYTERIAN PRESCHOOL

Giants come in many varieties. All around the world, there are giants in nature, giants made by people, and stories of make-believe giants. There are even giants mentioned in the Bible. Giants of all varieties share a common characteristic: size. All giants are, well... (to use a "wonderful word of the week") gigantic!

What gigantic prehistoric creatures fascinate preschoolers? Dinosaurs!

There was plenty of stomping and roaring going on in the classroom as we did the "Dino Pokey" (think dinosaurs doing the "Hokey Pokey") and sang, "We are the dinosaurs, marching, marching..." We compared dinosaur footprints to our measuring length and width, and wondered how we'd ever find shoes big enough to fit a dinosaur's foot! On our dino hunt we matched upper and lower case letters and matched numerals with the number of dinosaurs found in a group (try saying "six stegosauruses" ten times fast!!). We had great fun becoming paleontologists for the week! Our sand-filled sensory table became the excavation site. The children loved digging for "dino(chicken) saur" bones, brushing them off and categorizing them by size. To keep the dust from the drying sand at bay, we sprayed it with water a couple of times during each class. The children had such a good time that Mrs. Mitchell and I decided to let them dig again on Wednesday. No preschool classes on Tuesday, but when I went in that afternoon to set things out for the following morning, I noticed a "funny" smell in the classroom. Miss Kathy, who keeps our classroom sparkly clean, had noticed it too, but neither of us could track it down. Rex's tank? Fish tank? Hermit crabs? Trash cans? A few sprays of Febreeze seemed to help. By Wednesday morning, the odor smacked us in the nose as soon as we stepped through the door! When we lifted the lid off the sensory table there was no doubt where the rank smell was coming from! I did a quick excavation of my own, bagged up the bones and tossed the bag into the trash. The children dug for small plastic dinos and dinosaur cards that day! Lesson learned! Chicken bones + wet sand = PHEEEW!! (by Friday, all of the sand was removed, and the table cleaned out... New strategy next year!).

Majestic mountains, enormous rocks, and immense icebergs were some of the natural giants that we



the month discovered in November. We sorted and classified rocks, demonstrated how a waterfall is made and how rivers empty into the ocean (we washed some of the classroom floor at the same time!). It was great fun writing with "icicle" (popsicle) and balancing "mountain narrow а ledge" (aka Maela Mitchell's balance beam) to scoop up cotton ball "clouds" (tongs required for

small muscle building).

The Creator of these natural wonders has given people the creativity and intelligence to make some giants, too! Skyscrapers, bridges, ships, trains and roller coasters were so much fun to learn about! Our kiddos built some pretty amazing skyscrapers, walls and bridges of their own! And while we didn't really "build" a rollercoaster, we did get to go on a very exciting simulated ride of Knoebel's big wooden coaster!!

In Chapel times this past month we read about some enormous creatures that God made, including the big fish that swallowed runaway Jonah. The children enjoyed play-acting that story! We also read the story of a Bible time skyscraper of sorts—the tower of Babel—and talked about the sad consequences of believing we don't need God, and the importance of honoring God and being thankful. Even the most gigantic basket in the whole world could not hold all of the reasons we have to say "Thank You!" to God! For Mrs. Mitchell and me, there are 16 amazing reasons to give thanks. They come chattering and laughing into the classroom three days a week, full of life and eager to learn! Each child brings his or her own unique giftedness and personality with them, adding depth and beauty to our little school family. We truly do thank God for the privilege of teaching and growing with our kiddos! As we enter the world of Zoom classroom and remote learning for the next several weeks we are grateful for the technology that allows us to maintain connection and provide a platform from which learning can continue. We are especially thankful for the wonderful support we have received from our students' parents and the church Session.

We wish you all a wonderful holiday season, focused on the incredible gift of Jesus, and filled with the peace that comes from trusting in his **gigantic** love for each of us!


