"THE TRIP OF A LIFETIME! – 'Come, spend forty days in the wilderness!'" I don't know too many people who would get excited over this invitation, never mind make plans to go. Yet, this is the invitation that we, as a church, have been given as we stand on the threshold of this year's Lenten season. Why does it seem we just put our Christmas decorations away?

The forty-some days between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday have a much different feel than the weeks of the Christmas season we celebrated not too long ago. Unlike the of Advent, there are no festive season decorations; no adornments beyond the seasonal paraments; no greenery, no lights. We enter Lent in a somber mood, needing to set our wills both to begin and finish the course. It is a season of humility and surrender. Of repentance and fasting. Of quiet and waiting. Of connecting with the suffering of Jesus and the suffering of our fellow humans. Of drawing deeper into the love of Christ. These practices are difficult enough for adults. Can we really expect children to "get it" (can we count trying to lead our family through a devotional reading and activity as part of the suffering we enter)? I must confess that a weekly family time is way easier and more attractive to do during Advent! And yet, the desire to go deeper, to understand more fully the call to be a disciple of Jesus and encourage my family (grown kids and grandkids, now) to do the same, seems even greater during this time of year.

While I'm confessing, I'll also admit that though the thought of being able to go off on a forty-day retreat by myself (minus the forty days of no food...) is initially appealing, I'm sure I would go stir-crazy after a week—maybe sooner. Every year it seems I ask myself the same two questions: how can I help make this Lent meaningful for our church families and for myself in the midst of our normal (busy) schedules?

While forty days of solitude and contemplation is not an option, moments of the same are do-able. Sometimes even daily moments of time set aside seems overwhelming—especially for families with varying ages of children. Setting aside some focused moments once a week, on the other hand, is not out of reach. And the spiritual rewards are so worth the effort!

For the 2021 Lenten Season (Wednesday, February 17—Saturday, April 3) the Christian Education Committee (thanks to the suggestion of Pastor Sarah) will be offering "Lent in a Bag" to our church family. In the bag you will find a collection of objects—symbols to be used as conversation starters (questions included) and individual reflection.

There is a story from the Bible included with each object. All that you will need for the season of Lent is included in the bag. *Everyone* is encouraged to participate, whether single or in a family, child or adult or in between.

The Lenten bags will be distributed at the Ash Wednesday service and also available for pick-up at the church office throughout Lent. Feel free to pick up a bag for a friend! I think you will find Lent in a Bag to be a meaningful and engaging encouragement in your Lenten journey. It may just be "the (stay-at-home) trip of a life-time"!

JANUARY THAW

At this writing, all of the snow has gone out of here in Treaster Valley. Even the shaded areas beneath the hemlock trees now show only dead leaves and broken branches. Our January thaw came early this year, and we all been enjoying have the unusually warm weather. Many of us can remember years when we were not so lucky. One particular winter stands out in my memory when I was a sixth grade student at the little one room school where I began my public education. The ground had been covered with snow since Thanksgiving Day. Almost weekly blizzards piled up more



snow. So it was a welcome relief to see the temperature rise to above freezing, and the snow blanket considerably reduced in depth.

When this happened, Miss Wiggins, our teacher thought that we could all play outside during our lunch hour. It was a welcomed opportunity after months of inside games, such as eraser tag and marbles (would you believe that we boys even played mumblety-peg with our ever present pocket knives). Once outside we soon tracked the whole schoolyard with cow catchers, figure eights and other designs. Then we found that we had a field of fine "packing" snow which made wonderful snowballs. Now, we knew that snowball fights were not allowed; so the next best thing was to build a snowman. We boys started first and rolled a ball until we could no longer move it. Then the copy cat girls rolled one of their own right next to ours. Thus began a competition to see who could build the highest snowman. Snowballs were piled upon snowballs until both were higher than any of us

kids. Coal shovels and scuttles were pressed into service to add mass to our molded mountains of snow. Miss Wiggins, undoubtedly enjoying the quiet classroom, did not ring the bell to end our fun. Loud arguments broke out as to which snowman was taller, wider or prettier.

Soon, strange а thing happened. The snowmen, built hurriedly without sound engineering, began to lean toward each other until they actually touched each other and held each other up. Their contact formed an arch bridge under which we could, from the tallest to the smallest, march in a row until the bell rang. We all went gleefully back to our

classes. For at least one day we had learned that much more can be accomplished by cooperation instead of competition. A return of cold weather preserved our bridge for a few more days, until a well meaning parent, fearing a collapse, broke it down.

We, of many faiths and denominations are to be building the Church of Christ. Competition will not work—cooperation will. At the beginning of a new year it is our opportunity and obligation to build the ministry and mission of our church together. Concepts and ideas long frozen by habit and tradition need to thaw. The warmth of our fellowship and worship will enable us to build a strong Christian Witness in our community.

And...WE'RE BACK!! The church office hallway is sporting a line of coats, back packs and artwork once again and the preschool classroom sounds as it should when children are going about the joyfilled business of learning. January 11 was a happy day of



re-opening in-person Pre-K! Everyone was **very** excited to get back to school! In the words of one preschooler, "I like this better than ZOOM!"

We were grateful to be able to maintain a schedule and connection during the five weeks of on-line learning. Certainly not ideal, especially for four and five year olds, but God faithfully provided energy and creativity for three ZOOM's a week. A shoutout to our families who were able to make the switch to this platform and kept showing up with their child/grandchild each class time! We applaud your consistent (sometimes "insistent") efforts! It was fun to meet brothers, sisters and pets, and get a peek into our kiddos' classrooms at home. Most days, the hour flew by so quickly that we could hardly believe it was time to sing our goodbye song!

The theme for four of the five weeks online was "Choices." One of the children's favorite choices of ZOOM activities was a scavenger hunt. We used many variations on the theme: "find a food that's shaped like a square, triangle, etc.;" "find something red, yellow, etc." "Find something that begins with the sound that "B," "L," etc. makes." Our thanks again to parents for being flexible and allowing your cupboards to be upended! We talked about making helpful and healthy choices with help from the story of The Little Red Hen. Sadly, we weren't able to make our own bread this year, but we still sequenced the process of bread making from seed to loaf. Then, positioned with two pieces of bread and a butter knife in front of them, each child sliced into the basics of fractions. More lessons about healthy choices included talking about the importance of regular dentist and doctor visits. One send-home packet contained a zip-lock bag of paper "teeth" that the children used to

practice counting, pasting, and brushing. Another packet held а kit" "Doctor's and "Physician's report" that we used on ZOOM to give one of our favorite teddy its annual bears check-up. Then, right before Christmas, we were very happy to

learn that Santa had chosen to ZOOM with us from his workshop at the North Pole! Apparently there was some sort of collaboration with Amazon and Santa's elves to insure that gifts were delivered to the classroom and then sent to each kiddo's home.

We began a new theme for the new year and rhymed our way into 2021 via ZOOM. Traditional nursery rhyme favorites like "Humpty Dumpty," "Hey Diddle Diddle" and "The Three Little Kittens" gave lots of opportunity for fun activities. Trying to keep the beat to "Miss Mary Mack" brought lots of giggles, and some YouTube "Exercise, Rhyme and Freeze" kept us on our toes quite literally. But the words that made us clap our hands, jump for joy, and spin around, were words that became the talk of the town. Not many words, but oh, so cool: "Students will return to school."! (Sorry—the rhyming thing grows on you).

There's been lots of energy in the classroom these past five days! Even Rex the turtle is noticeably happy to see the kids again! We've jumped right back in to circle time, centers and Chapel time with famous fairy tales from the Brothers Grimm and faith-filled truth tales from the Bible. There are beanstalks planted and waiting to sprout in their containers on the windowsill, puffy paint snowmen on the bulletin board and shape dragons hanging in the hallway. Watch for a soon to be "published" volume of original fairy tales from our favorite four and five year olds, and an upcoming video of circle time singing. We'll end the month learning some ballads, folktales, and fables that have been passed down through many generations. We're hoping to be back in the classroom for guite a while, but who knows for certain? We're back for now, though, and grateful to be here!
