Greetings! I hope this note finds you well as we welcome the month of March. We can't move into March without acknowledging what a year it has been for us all personally and as a church family. We have all endured the unexpected during the pandemic and at the moment we are surviving. Thanks be to God for God's strength and protection.

It has also been a year since I was installed as the pastor of Lewistown Presbyterian Church and let me just say, although it wasn't a year I expected or planned, it has been a joy to serve alongside you all. Many of the ways in which I thought we would get to know one another were impossible to do as we stopped gathering in groups, remained in our homes and social distanced from each other.

Let me assure you that the opportunities to get to know one another better will be offered when the time is right. Jim, McKenzie, and I look forward to welcoming you to the manse for a visit or meal. I look forward to visiting your loved one in the hospital or nursing home. The day will come when we can do so!

Until then, I thought it might be helpful to highlight some ways in which the Deacons and I want you to feel connected and supported at this time. As many of you know, the Deacons are given the responsibility in our denominational Book of Order to serve in the following manner, "The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, the hungry, the sick, the lost, the friendless, the oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies or structures, or anyone in distress." Essentially, one of the important tasks of our Board of Deacons is to provide congregational care and attend to the needs of people in our community beyond our church walls.

When I arrived to serve as the pastor at LPC, the Deacons were working with Fellowship Committee Elders to establish what they have coined, "Shepherd Teams." The purpose of the Shepherd Teams is to assign church members to each Deacon. Each Deacon then establishes a "connection" to the members of their Shepherd Team and provides support, care and ongoing communication with the members they are assigned.

I think it was providential that this plan came about prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. It has been helpful to create a ministry plan so that our church can stay connected to one another in a unique way. From a pastoral perspective, it has been a blessing to know that church members have another way to be checked on other than through me.

This doesn't mean that I'm leaving the pastoral care to the Deacons. I'm doing my best to meet as many folks as I can, at this point through phone calls and cards, until we can meet in person. The responsibility of caring for the congregation isn't the sole responsibility of the pastor, though. It is a shared responsibility of the pastor, church officers, and members, too.

As with any new ministry program, we are learning best practices in utilizing the Shepherd Teams. I encourage you to offer some grace as the Deacons (and I) utilize the teams to get to know each of you and to help you get to know other folks in your Shepherd Team. My hope is that once you know who your Deacon assigned to you is and a relationship begins that you will have an opportunity to meet and get to know the other church members in your Shepherd Team.

The creation of the Shepherd Teams, I believe, is an example of the way in which all our church officers are constantly thinking about ways to care for our church family. I appreciate the collaboration between the Fellowship Committee Elders and the Deacons in beginning this program for the benefit of us all.

Today is Friday; the first Friday after Ash Wednesday. We are officially two days into the season of Lent. The world outside my window is a mix of gray and white; a wonderland or wilderness, depending on your feelings toward winter right now. Regardless, the usual traffic, either horse-powered by cylinders or hooves is nowhere to be seen. Or heard. The early morning is silent. No birds calling or dogs barking. Now if I can just get my thoughts guieted and focused so that I can begin this Lenten devotional. Coffee helps. After looking over the booklet from "Lent in a Bag" on my computer, I've decided to read and think about Jesus' wilderness experience during this first week of Lent. I pick up my daily planner and write, "bring home the bag" (it's still sitting at church and I'm thinking that the hands on activity would surely help with focus). Then I pick up my Bible. I wonder, as I turn the pages looking for Luke 4, what on earth did Jesus do in the wilderness for forty days?

I remember the time I got to experience the Judean wilderness while on a trip to Israel. Our tour group was traveling up to Jerusalem from the Dead Sea with a scheduled stop in the desert along the way. Our assignment, after unloading from the bus, was to find a spot away from anyone else in the group, then sit and "take in the wilderness" until the bus horn called us back. Picking my way up a rock-strewn slope, I was glad I had my jacket (once I got settled on a flattish rock I wished I also had a stadium cushion. Nothing comfy about a rock) The wind was constant and chilly. Its eerie moan was the only sound to be heard across the great expanse of dirt and rocks and scrub brush. I closed my eyes and let the emptiness of the desert wash over me. That took about five minutes. Snapping a series of pictures took another five. Pulling my binoculars out from under my jacket, I scanned the wadis and terraced landscape that stretched beyond what was magnified times ten. Vast emptiness. I tried to pray. I attempted to remember psalms that spoke of David's time in the wilderness. I felt restless. Mercifully, the bus horn sounded and I made my way back to our tour group, relieved but also frustrated. Had I missed something? Our guide had given us fifteen minutes. It had felt more like an hour. I

remember asking myself then, "How did Jesus make it for forty days in this wasteland?"

And suddenly, I wonder, "Is this the same attitude that I (and maybe others) approach Lent?" "How am I going to make it through forty days of... (fill in the blank; prayer, fasting of some sort, devotional readings, etc.)? This season is a call to solitude and self-examination; to moving through dark places of the heart; to change. It. Is. Hard. Hard rocks in a desolate, chilly, uncomfortable space. And, yet...

I find Luke 4. Reading through the assigned verses, I'm stopped by two phrases: "Then Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit"... "was led by the Spirit into the wilderness" (footnote: "driven" "compelled" by the Spirit). This forty-day wilderness test was God-directed. Did Jesus know what he was getting into? Did he struggle when faced with no food, no human company and the unrelenting barrage of Satan's flaming arrows? I don't know. Whether Jesus struggled here or not, his actions mirrored those of future Gethsemane, "not my will, but yours be done." Maybe this is part of the answer to my questions of how Jesus made it in the wilderness and what he did there...Jesus trusted God, his Father. He surrendered his will (his fears, his doubts, his questions, too?) to his Father, God. "Filled with the Holy Spirit," the very essence of love and life, and grounded in the truth of his Father's words, "You are my dearly loved Son and you bring me great joy," Jesus allowed himself to be borne along by the Spirit into the desert wilderness where he was tempted, sustained and able to return to Galilee after forty days, "filled with the Holy Spirit's power."

Maybe Lent is more about giving in to the invitation to draw close to God, than giving up a favorite food or hindering habit. Maybe more about our surrender than our determination. More about day by day yielding ourselves to God's transforming work in us than forty days of steeling ourselves to change habits we think might keep God from working.

Hmm...I jot these thoughts in my journal and look out the window. A squall of snow has added itself to the gray, white morning. Suddenly the stillness is broken by a distant cardinal's "Cheer, cheer, cheer!" I smile and remember, "You are my

#### THE EASTER STORY

A recent conversation with a friend, who is also a Presbyterian, has given me an Easter message, which I would like to share with you, our Panorama readers. She is a dog fancier and often participates in shows with her dogs. Knowing this about her, I asked her if she had attended the Westminster dog competition in New York City. She had done so as an observer. She remarked about the "Best of Show" winner, which was a little Beagle. She noticed how proudly the little dog had walked in the arena, oblivious to everything except to be brought a flashback memory of such a hound that was a part of our farm family during the days of my childhood. Her name was Lady, and she faithfully fulfilled her duties, which consisted of barking at strangers and chasing the rabbits from our garden and orchard.

My friend also mentioned sadly the apparent poisoning of one of the magnificent show dogs, presumably by a jealous exhibitor who feared the competition that such an animal may present. Then she gave the sentence which is the heart and message of this article. She said of the deceased dog, "He was so good that he was killed." In the plight of that poor innocent beast we can find no more perfect illustration of the Easter story which we observe every year. Unfortunately, the central thread of this story has been repeated endlessly throughout the history of mankind. An anthology of such stories my be found in a book entitled, Martyrs Mirror (I understand that this is one of the two books allowed in conservative Amish homes. The other being the Bible). This book is the record of the people who have been killed because of their faith. At least two members of our congregation have traced members of their ancestry to such tragic situations.

So, also was the fate of Gandhi who believed and practiced passive resistance, only to be martyred by a misguided person. Another example, Abraham Lincoln, whose basic goodness and humanity brought about his own assassination 150 years ago. In more recent times, we remember Martin Luther King, Jr., who met the same sad end.

I would mention another who gave his life for a noble Christian cause. Elijah Lovejoy was a Presbyterian newspaper publisher whose abolitionist writings were beginning to sway minds to oppose slavery. The destruction of his presses and possessions failed to silence him. The next step of his protagonists was to kill him.

There is a similar thread that runs through all of these examples, and many others, known and unknown. This is the central and essential theme of Easter.

Romans 5:6,8 "For when we were yet without strength, in due time, Christ died for the ungodly...But God commends His love toward using that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us."

Our Easter hymn puts it in perfect perspective. "There was no other good enough to pay the price of sin He only could unlock the gate of Heaven and let us in." There is a Green Hill Far Away—Cecil Frances Alexander.

We began our new unit with a week of construction terms and a review of shapes. Circles and squares? Easy-peasy. Rectangles and triangles? A little trickier. As for those rhombuses and octagons? Unfortunately, the weather made the morning class wait a few days for theirs, but they were able to celebrate at last!

The children's creativity and cutting skills got put to good use making Valentine cards for their grown -ups. Lots of colorful love snippets everywhere! There's a good reason the material used for making the cards is called, "construction" paper!

Two other classroom friends had fun constructing some projects of their own. Star and Magic Wand, rather mischievous and adventuresome pointers that help with the daily calendar and counting activities, have been recently found "hanging out" in different parts of the classroom. One morning we came in to find them suspended from the ceiling admiring the snowman they had constructed; and the piles of "snowballs" they had left next to Frosty. No one needed to consult an instruction manual - we knew just what to do with the snowballs! Then, on the day of our Valentine party, the two plastic pranksters were once again poised in mid-air - this time on giant hearts- we supposed the hearts were Star's and Magic Wand's way of wishing us a Happy Valentine's Day and decorating for the party.
